A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

This week in Maths EYFS have been busy recognising how different sets have been sorted. In phonics they have started to read words such as dip man and nap using all the phonemes they have learnt so far. (s a t p i n m d) They have been learning about our senses and how we use them. They have also recycled our story 'A Squash and Squeeze' and have new characters and a new setting, you might like to ask your child who is now in the story and where it is set!

Year 1 have been amazing at identifying human and physical features this week in Geography. They have been looking at interesting locations in our local area and nationally, using special actions to support their memory.

Year 2 have been taken part in a scavenger atlas hunt to support their developing skills in Geography this week. They have been identifying symbols on a map of the UK, identifying why they are used and used the index to find places in the UK.

This week in Year 3 we have been playing different rhythms on the recorder, they had a great swimming lessons learning new skills and learning how to say how we feel in in French. The children have done really well with their French using the vocabulary they have been learning not just in French lessons. Well done Year 3!

Year 4 have had a very special and exciting beginning to this week, preparing and performing their class worship about families and how we are all part of not on only God's family but also part if the community, school and of course our own family.

This week, our Year 5 students have taken on the role of passionate environmentalists as they ventured into the world of renewable energy. With their analytical skills in full swing, they embarked on an exciting journey to compare and contrast potential areas for the installation of wind turbines.

Guided by their commitment to a greener future, our Year 5 environmentalists carefully examined factors such as geographical features and accessibility to determine the most suitable locations. This hands-on project not only encouraged critical thinking but also fostered a deep understanding of the importance of sustainable energy sources. Our young environmentalists have not only learned about the benefits of wind power but have also demonstrated their dedication to preserving our planet. We then moved on to making our own wind turbines to test whether our chosen locations would be suitable.

Wednesday they did some gardening and weeding of the school herb garden followed by den building and soup and bread making. Thursday and Friday were filled with a variety of art based activities, creating a new display in the school on Protected Characteristics.

GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK



Every day of our lives we have to make choices. Sometimes we make the wrong choice and do something we shouldn't. Remember that whenever we have had a change of heart. Jesus is always ready to give us another chance to put things right.

Jesus' parables are always designed to challenge us to examine our own responses to God. The chief priests to whom this parable was directed were failing to recognise the reality of the situation. Have there been times when you too have been in this position? Times when you have said you were going to do something and not done it? How did you feel in breaking your promise? Have you had experiences of being pressured into agreeing to something when you would rather have said 'no'? Or failing to do something when you knew that you should act? As you consider your response to the demands that being a follower of Jesus calls you to in your day to day experiences, can you identify what were the 'no' moments of the last few days? What were the 'yes' moments? How could you consider changing your negative responses in the coming week?
