## A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

EYFS have been learning a song about Hedgehogs. Mrs Bradley has written her own version of @We're going on a Bear Hunt' called 'We're going on a Hedgehog Hunt.' Through learning about Hedgehogs the children have edited and improved the story. Watch out for the performance on Tapestry.

This week, year 1 had a lot of fun in science exploring their sense of taste. The children learned that their tongue has tiny bumps with taste buds in that tells their brain whether a taste is sweet, sour, bitter, salty or savoury. They tasted and classified many different foods based on their taste.

This week in Year 2 we have been drafting our Little Red Reading Hood stories using our sentence strips. We have also been writing our story alongside the story mountain to make sure we don't forget the beginning, middle and ending of our stories. In Maths we have been ordering objects and ordering numbers from smallest to largest and also finding missing numbers on number lines. We have also been using and applying our pastel skills in Art recreating a city -scape in the style of Claude Monet.

Year 3 did amazing in their class worship this week planning what they wanted to do and the song they wanted to sing with actions. They have also been doing really well having a go at column addition and subtraction in Maths and are very enthusiastic in French well done Year 3.

Year 4 have been learning how to make descriptive statements about their friends personalities in French.

This week, Year 5 have been on an artistic journey, drawing inspiration from the legendary Banksy and Keith Haring, to experiment with the dynamic interplay of negative and positive space. With passion as their driving force, our Year 5 students have skilfully crafted street art stencils that convey satirical messages that deeply resonate with them. From thought-provoking statements to colourful motifs. Their sketchbooks have become a true reflection of their unwavering dedication and focus in their art topic this term. Each page is a testament to their hard work and growing talent.

This week in Year 6 we have been working on developing our artistic skills through use of tones, tints and shades to create landscape images that show atmospheric perspective. We were able to select from a variety of media (pastels, paints and chalks) to create our landscapes.

#### **Whatsapp Guidance**



Most Social media apps are for pupils 13 years and over, however, Whatsapp is for pupils 16+.If you or a family member have already set this up on your child's phone or opened an account for your child then you have already breached the Terms and Conditions for using this app – it might be time to read the Terms and Conditions for Whatsapp again. If you do allow your child to access social media, we ask for your vigilance; we ask for your support and most importantly we ask that you take responsibility for how and what your child is messaging to others.

Just like their interactions in person, online interactions require supervision and support. We understand that they are growing up and require a level of privacy and personal space, however, they are using an app aimed at pupils of 16 years +, therefore we still need to guide and support their use in this online area.

What is right will vary from family to family but some strategies that are known to be successful include:

- Monitoring their phones for the apps that are downloaded
- Enacting parental controls on phones and consoles
- Reviewing the messages they send on platforms and apps making monitoring part of a daily or weekly routine
- Setting expectations about what space (preferably communal) and times they have access to devices
- Encouraging them to share or discuss with you what they are doing.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH- SALUTING OUR SISTERS- DR ANNE-MARIE **IMAFIDON MBE** 

Have you heard of Dr Anne-Marie Imafidon MBE? She is a prodigy in every sense of the word. Aged 11, she was the youngest girl ever to pass A-level computing, and was just 20 years old when she received her Master's Degree in Mathematics and Computer Science from the University of Oxford. It is this wealth of experience and pioneering spirit that led her to co-found the Stemettes, an award-winning social initiative dedicated to inspiring and promoting the next generation of young women in the STEM sectors. Since its inception 10 years ago, it has exposed 60,000 young people across Europe to Anne-Marie's vision for a more diverse and balanced science and tech community. #### Week 2 of natural disasters:

#### **Volcanoes**

A volcano is an opening in the Earth's surface.

Usually found in a mountain, the opening allows gas, hot magma and ash to escape from beneath the Earth's crust. The word "volcano" comes from the Roman name "Vulcan".

"But who was Vulcan?" He was the Roman god of fire! Volcanoes are often found at meeting points of "tectonic plates". These plates are pieces of the Earth's surface that fit together just like a jigsaw puzzle. Volcanoes can also occur over "mantle plumes". Ever heard of mantle plumes? They're super-hot areas of rock inside the Earth! Approximately 350 million people live within "danger range" of an active volcano. Volcanoes are classified as active, dormant or extinct. This refers to the amount of volcanic activity. "Active" means there's regular activity, "dormant" means there's been recent activity but the volcano is currently quiet, and "extinct" means it's been so long since the last eruption that it's unlikely to ever erupt again. Magma and lava are two different things! Magma is the name given to hot liquid rock inside a volcano. Once it leaves the volcano, it's known as lava.
