A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

Nativity is well underway and the children were very excited to put on their costumes for a full dress rehearsal. EYFS have enjoyed starting their RE Birthdays topic learning about the word Birthday, the day they are born and that a very special baby celebrates their birthday on Christmas Day. EYFS are excited to be moving into the season of Advent and are ready to change their prayer cloths to purple. They enjoyed the Advent treat, making angels and Christmas cards and learning that they are messengers of God!

In RE this week, Year 1 created beautiful Advent calendars in preparation for Christmas. The children filled the days with symbols of the Christmas story as well as daily missions to prepare their hearts for Jesus.

Year 2 this week have been learning their lines and sharing their roles in the Nativity. They have been excited about their costumes and are beginning to act their lines out as the characters with greater precision. In Science we have been learning how to test and record the properties of different materials we can find in and around our school. We have also been learning about the process of recycling.

Elliot has shown great enthusiasm in his learning this week, and made Tutankhamun from Lego at home, the children have shown great interest in their science learning about the human body, the muscles, bones and how it all works together. They have drawn some fantastic cross section pictures in their books.

Year 4 had a lovely morning on Thursday making angels and nativity cards during our Advent retreat. They have also been busy designing their torches in DT this week. Thank you to all the children who have bought in cardboard and plastic bottles so far.

Year 5 have been full of creativity, weaving powerful metaphorical comparisons in their writing that transports the reader straight into the heart of the Blitz. This week's journey was not just about mastering literary techniques; we delved into the history and emotions of a significant time. As we bid adieu to our World War 2 poetry unit, we will celebrate each budding poet's creativity in computing. Year 5 will have the opportunity to record their poems using the videography skills they have learnt this term - look out for snapshot videos on Twitter in the forthcoming weeks!

Year 6 have had a busy week completing DT tasks, RE learning and the final draft of their non-chronological reports. On Wednesday the children prepared and led a thoughtful and reflective worship about Advent that led nicely into the Advent Retreat Day on Thursday. As part of their worship the children explained the symbolism of the Advent Wreath. They recreated one using a hoop, branches, and people as candles. They ended their worship by sharing an Advent song with a dance that they created.

The weather has changed for now to colder conditions, so just remember in this cold blast the following:

- Dress in layers, with a wind resistant outer layer, a hat, mittens or gloves, a scarf, and warm and waterproof footwear.
- Cover as much exposed skin as possible, especially when the wind chill is significant.
- Cover your mouth to protect your lungs from extreme cold.
- Stay dry and out of the wind. Wet clothing chills the body quickly.
- Monitor your physical condition and that of others around you. Know the symptoms of cold stress. The elderly and young children are at most risk.
- Move into warm locations during breaks.
- Avoid touching cold metal surfaces with bare skin.
- Prepare ahead of time and avoid going outside for long periods of time.
 Have a safe, cosy weekend as we mark the start of the season of Advent.

GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK



The word Advent means coming. It is a time of waiting and expectation. Only God knows when the second coming will be, but in today's Gospel we are reminded that we must stay awake and be ready for Jesus when he returns at the end of time. At this time of the year we are reminded to keep awake and to call upon God for mercy. When we are preparing for anything what do we do? We look forward to the event that is about to happen with excitement and sometimes with a little trepidation.

The Gospel today tells us that we don't know when the waited for event is going to happen. We are told to always be on our guard to always be expecting the end of things as we know them. There are some things during a time of waiting that we can keep on growing in our lives. Talk to strangers!

Online Safety: Omegle

This week a parent guide has been shared with you via email concerning Omegle.

Omegle is a website offering a free video chat service which will connect you to a random stranger who you can interact with through text chat and webcam. There is no Omegle app currently available to download. No account or username is required to use the service and users are anonymous unless they choose to tell other users about themselves. Users should be 18+ or over 13 years with parental permission. The main page of the site has a direct link to an adult site which streams adult sexual content. There are no parental controls or privacy tools available at all through Omegle other than the ability to stop a chat and move to another user.

There are both moderated and unmoderated video chat features. The unmoderated chat carrying an 18+ age requirement and a warning that there is a high likelihood of viewing sexual content and coming into contact with potentially predatory individuals.


Norah's Ark-Victoria Williamson



<u>Year of Preparation & Prayer - Encounter - First Sunday of Advent (3rd December 2023) - Christmas Eve morning</u> (24th December 2024)

Although the Jubilee is being celebrated in 2025, the Holy Father Pope Francis has asked for two years of preparation before the Jubilee Year itself. The first of these is coming to a close: 2023 has been a year dedicated to revisiting afresh the fruits of the Second Vatican Council, and the four great constitutions in particular. Alongside resources provided by the Bishops' Conference of England and Wales, Nottingham Deanery has taken a lead in organising speakers to present talks about Dei Verbum, Sacrosanctum Concilium, Gaudium et Spes, and Lumen Gentium. These are all available on the diocesan website. The coming three years will form a tripos of celebrations around the Jubilee, tying-in with the diocesan Spiritual Themes as well as the celebrations across the Universal Church. Bishop Patrick asked the entire Diocese of Nottingham to consider the three Themes back in November 2018, and since then they have been well established in a pattern of Encounter in the Advent Term; Discipleship in the Lent Term; and Missionary Discipleship in the Pentecost Term

From Advent 2023 the focus will be changed slightly to align with the Jubilee, so that there is a whole year of Encounter in 2024, to tie-in with the Year of Preparation focusing on Prayer in its many forms.
