






Mrs Franklin's Recommended Reads!

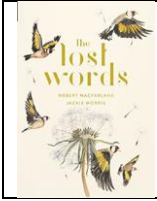


"There is no such thing as a child who hates to read; there are only children who have not found the right book."

Markus Motum's stylish illustrations and diagrams reveal how a robot travelled 350,000,000 miles to explore a planet where no human has ever been.
	<i>Stuart Little</i>	<i>E. B. White</i>	Stuart Little is no ordinary mouse. Born to a family of humans, he lives in New York City with his parents, his older brother George, and Snowbell the cat. Though he's shy and thoughtful, he's also a true lover of adventure. Stuart's greatest adventure comes when his best friend, a beautiful little bird named Margalo, disappears from her nest. Determined to track her down, Stuart ventures away from home for the very first time in his life. He finds adventure aplenty. But will he find his friend?
	<i>The Butterfly Lion</i>	<i>Michael Morpurgo</i>	Bertie rescues an orphaned white lion cub from the African veld.
