

MESSAGE FROM MRS WITH

In Foundation the children have remembered so many routines and are keen to show independence, putting coats and bags away, selecting tools for learning and choosing their own learning spot on the carpet. They are really developing those listening skills this week and have enjoyed sharing a story about being a super h<mark>ero, spotting things that are the</mark> same, different and used craft materials to create pictures of themselves. They have also joined in with our weekly songs and tapped instruments this week in music to a beat. Outdoor learning was great fun too!

Year 1 had a very exciting outdoor learning day, linking to their senses in science, counting and nu<mark>mber bonds in</mark> maths, natural portraits for art and basic safety skills. They children had a fabulous time, enjoying the fresh air and

In Year 2 this week we have been learning about the Human life cycle and comparing this with a Frog Life Cycle. We have also been learning about using adjectives to make more interesting sentences in English. In our maths this week we have been writing numbers in words and using our counting on and counting back skills. We have really enjoyed our Monet landscape and trying to use pastels to blend and create atmosphere.

Year 3 have undertaken an investigation to see if a bean will grow in cotton wool in a bag attached to the window.

Year 4 have had a great time this week learning about electrical circuits. They have been exploring how to make a working circuits, draw circuits using the appropriate symbols and make predictions as to whether a diagram of a circuit will work or not.

In Year 5 this week we have been exploring forces and have made our own parachutes to investigate the effects of air resistance.

This week in Year 6 we have been exploring the way different types of mountains are formed and the features that they have. Everyone had listened carefully as they were able to identify the different types of mountains based on pictures of different mountain ranges. Did you know that the earths crust floats on a sea of magma and is always moving, even though we cannot feel it!

You may have noticed the new road markings and signs outside school along Tollgate. Please follow the parking regulations as set out. GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK



In this week's Gospel the disciples were arguing and fighting about who was the best and the most important. They were jealous of one another. It is OK to feel jealous - we all do that from time to time - but Jesus is warning us about how we behave or act when we are jealous.

While this Gospel predicts the passion and death of Jesus, there are a number of other themes involved - one of which is the message that special hospitality should be offered to those from whom we can benefit the least. The trust that Jesus places in God he compares to the trust of a little child. Jesus uses the opportunity of the discussion over who is the greatest to teach the disciples what the ideal of "first place" must be in the Church community which they will become once he is no longer with them. Our faith should make a difference in the way we treat others. Jesus draws on the simplicity and humility of the child as a model for us. If you consider one or two of the 'great' people you know, how could they be described as servants?

Me and My Brian - Helen Rutter



FACTS AND CHALLENGES

170 years of the weather forecaster Met Office

It's often said that talking about the weather is a British national obsession. So, it's no wonder that since the 19th century, the UK has had its own organisation dedicated to predicting whether we need to grab a brolly or stick on sunglasses.

However, the Met Office does much more than that – from forecasting conditions for seafaring ships to helping us track the health of our planet.

10 nations (including Great Britain) met in Brussels, Belgium for the first ever International Meteorological Conference in 1853. Their aim was to agree a system for observing and logging weather conditions at sea. Just a year later in 1854, the UK parliament founded the organisation that would later be called the Met Office based on this.

A sizzling 40.3°C was recorded by the Met Office at Coningsby, Lincolnshire on 19 July 2022 – the hottest UK temperature ever recorded. Yikes! Thankfully, as climate change means these extreme weather events become more frequent, the Met Office will be there to help us prepare.


Writing Competition - The Solstice Prize 2024 - Closes 31st October 2024


