his week Year 1 applied their knowledge of Picasso's colour theories to their own se<mark>lf-portraits, demonstrating</mark> mood through their colour choices. There was some exceptional use of spatial awarene<mark>ss when drawing out their</mark> facial features and exciting colour choices too. Impressive!

This week in Year 2 we have been using expanded noun phrases and improving our word choices in <mark>English. We</mark> have begun to use the Daily Ten Maths programme to test and consolidate our addition and subtraction skills. We have also had a opportunity to go and explore the woods and outdoor area as part of our learning using simple

This week Year 3 children have been investigating if a bean would grow in cotton wool, they have evaluated their investigation which all have successfully grown, we have discussed the process that has taken place and evaluate the growing process of the seed, how it has been watered from the condensation collected from the heat of the

Year 4 have been learning about the artist Frida Kahlo, we have been critiquing her works of art, creating patterns that mimic her style and using water colours to experiment with shades and tones.

In Year 5 we have been exploring the work of famous street artist Banksy. We considered the style of his work and what messages he may be trying to convey. We will be creating our own Banksy inspired work later in the term.

Children from Year 6 who were not attending the trip this week were very busy for those 3 days. We made balloon powered cars; became chefs, cooking delicious tomato soup; spent the afternoon in our outdoor learning area, we build the lairs/homes for the creatures and animals out of clay.

GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK



Jesus places great importance on people giving good example and following others good example. Jesus also wants us to learn to be tolerant of both our own and other people's faults and their gifts - that means celebrating their successes and forgiving their failings. Being tolerant can sometimes be tough.

One of the saddest facts of Christianity must surely be the divisions and in-fighting that occur between groups of differing Christian denominations or even groups within the same church. The Holy Spirit often works in and through people who are outside the expected. How open are we to others?

Can you think of a time when you mistrusted or misjudged someone who was outside your group, or made efforts to welcome someone new and different?

Today is Jesus calling us to examine just how tolerant we are of others with a differing faith experience? How well do we reflect Jesus' generosity of spirit?

In what ways has God been at work in your life up to now? Which aspects of your life may need to be pruned in order that you can flourish in your faith and come closer to God?

Encounter

One way we get to encounter God and Jesus is through God's creation, the natural world. When we read the creation story in Genesis, we hear that 'the Spirit of God was moving over the water.' (Genesis 1:2)

When we experience the natural world, we are having a direct encounter with God, we are 'coming to know God'. However, this encounter is not a one-way experience as it involves us in a very personal way. We are able to live off the natural world from the food and water it provides, we are spiritually renewed as we spend time in nature and we care for nature as we work to care and protect it.

Solidarity

Solidarity is the feeling of unity and support for others. It is essential for building a just and compassionate society. In the Catholic faith, we are called to be in solidarity with the poor and the marginalized and with those who are suffering, both physically and emotionally. YouTube - Parental Controls for Teens

Google (YouTube) have, in the past, always argued that YouTube is strictly for over 13's, much like most other social platforms. This age is predominantly for marketing/advertising purposes. However, that argument has never stood up given that Google have never had a means to prevent under 13's using the platform wither with or without an account.

Back in 2021 YouTube introduced new parental features, called Supervised Experience, and this was for parents of children under 13 who were using YouTube.

Now, it looks like YouTube is extending Supervised Experience for parents of teenagers. In early September they announced that parents/carers will be able to link their teenagers account to the parent account where parents will have the ability to see some limited information such as number of video uploads, comments etc.

I think some parents may be disappointed that this is quite a limited set of features and I would agree. You can read more about this HERE.


First-place winners in each age category will receive £100 and have their work published in the 2024 Solstice Anthology.
