FROM MRS WITH

Foundation are really showing they know many of the class rules and routines and are using their visual timetable to talk about their day. They have learnt the first set of phonemes in phonics, been busy sorting objects and have enjoyed their class book, A Squash and a Squeeze. The Rhubarb Theatre Company and Lincolnshire Wildlife Group shared a lovely production all about looking after our animals, on land, and in the ocean, by putting our rubbish in the bin!

A part of their RE learning, Year 1 heard about the special letter from Pope Francis, calling us to take c<mark>are of our world. We linked this</mark> to our Catholic Social Teaching -Stewardship and learned which materials were recyclable or not. We the<mark>n took litter pickers and</mark> gloves to clear up our school grounds, remembering to recycle everything we could!

In Year 2 this week we have been learning about intervals in Maths, counting ten more and ten less than 2 digit numbers <mark>and using</mark> Daily Ten to speed up our recall. In English we have used our picture planner to support our writing of a story using adjectives, noun phrases and key vocabulary. We have also enjoyed using Pastels in ART to recreate both landscapes and citiscapes in the style of the famous artist, Monet. We have also enjoyed learning about invasion games in PE, trying to follow and shadow other people whilst moving quickly and slowly.

During Outdoor learning, Year 3 worked in teams to make Wigwams inspired by their Guided reading book 'Hiawatha' they wrote they used their own vocabulary and ideas to create their own version of the story.

Year 4 had a love afternoon on Thursday taking park in an Eco workshop with Gracie from the Lincolnshire Wildlife Trust. The children learnt about how to reduce, reuse and recycle waste and the damage that non-biodegradable products can gave on animal habitats.

In Year 5 we have been celebrating National Poetry Day. We have explored the poetry of Edward Lear and read The Jumblies. We then wrote some of our own cinquain poems and had a go at performing them in the style of Joseph Coehlo.

This week Year 6 have continued their exploration of the Science topic of 'Light'. This week they have been learning about how the eye works; they had great fun looking at a model of an eye and seeing the different parts of that work together to enable us to see. They also explored how glasses help to focus the light to support us to see better and the way that sunglasses protect our eyes from the harmful rays of the sun.

You may have noticed the new road markings and signs outside school along Tollgate. Please follow the parking regulations as set out. GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK

The Readings today speak to us about God's commitment to human partnership and the welfare of all creation as well as Jesus commitment to children, the model for all who belong to the kingdom of heaven. We are made in the image and likeness of God. How do we reflect this divine care for creation and our common humanity in the everyday moments of our lives?

In the Gospel Jesus points to the example of children not because they are naive but because they are more open to reality and to the workings of the spirit than adults.

The Readings this Sunday speak to us about commitment to each other and to all people, commitment to the common humanity that binds us all to each other. The Readings speak of the major commitments we make to each other, marriage particularly, but also of Jesus' commitment to us (Second Reading, Hebrews 2:9-11, not used with the children this Sunday) and to children (Gospel) and God's commitment to the welfare of creation (First Reading). Ask the children to list the things that make commitments strong. In the Readings the equality of the woman and the man is also stressed.

Online Safety <u>Teen Brains, Technology and Social Media</u>

We sometimes need to take a step back and reflect on why children and young people do what they do. Whilst the online disinhibition effect is an important factor to understand, we need to remember that young brains are very different from our own adult brains.

Darren Laur, otherwise known as The White Hatter on Twitter is someone I have known and respected for many years and he writes some inspiring, thought provoking

In the article I'm referring to he writes about a way in which we can explain, very simplistically, the way in which the young brain develops, specifically concentrating on the limbic system and the pre-frontal cortex. In other words, why and how decisions are sometimes made, especially when emotions play a part.

Darren's method of explaining this is to use the X-Men, Wolverine and Professor Xavier. Wolverine (the limbic system) is the strong, impulsive and emotional character driven by instincts. Prof. Xavier (the pre-frontal cortex) is calm, measured, thoughtful and wise.

We've all had those "Why did you do that, what were you thinking.....?" moments. But understanding why adolescents may do things is really important when we're talking to them, it allows us to understand behaviour and also to shape the educational talks we're giving. In other words, try to avoid being judgemental.

I've used something similar in talks to young secondary students in the past. I remember a couple of years ago when a group of students came up to me at the end of the assembly and explained quite a serious situation they had got into. They were found out, and they got into trouble for it. They were told they were stupid (their words) for getting into that situation, that they should have known better. After the explanation in the assembly they agreed they were stupid (again, their words) but they didn't realise that at the time. Nobody had ever explained to them how emotions can take over rational decision making.

Antarctic Facts

Following the exciting news from Mrs Withers that our school's name will be going in a time capsule and buried in Antarctic, I thought some Antarctic facts would be interesting for you, enjoy!

- 1. Antarctica is the least populated continent. There are no residents living permanently here. Only around 1,000 people (in winter) and 10,000 people (in summer) live on the continent. These people are mainly based there for one year to live and work in the research stations. The research stations are scattered all around the continent.
- 2. According to size, Antarctica is the fifth largest continent of our planet. The continent is almost double the size of
- 3. Antarctica is an ice covered continent surrounded by the Southern Ocean. Almost all of the continent's land is covered by a thick layer of ice. On average the ice is 1.9 km/6,200 ft deep. The inland ice-sheet has a thickness of up to 4 km/13,000 ft.
- 4. Antarctica is the driest continent of the seven continents. Antarctica is an icy desert with very little rainfall throughout the year.
- 5. Antarctica is the windiest place on the earth where windspeed of more than 350 kilometres per hour/218 miles per hour have been measured.

NATIONAL POETRY


DAY
