

They have enjoyed finding out <mark>about people who help us and how,</mark> through the class Literacy book Heroes who help us from around the world. They have learnt about Guy Fawkes and have enjoyed taking on the role of firefighters. They have celebrated Diwali by making and sendin<mark>g Diwali cards. They have been</mark> arning to subitise in Maths and have started their group reading sessions!

Year 1 had a fabulous time in PE, learning how to jump and create shapes. They worked beautifully in pairs, making pike, star and v-balance shapes to name but a few. There was even some linking to build a short sequence. Very impr<mark>essive</mark>

In Year 2 this week we have been ordering dates for the Great Fire of London. We have been recalling key facts abou<mark>t where the</mark> fire started and how the fire began. In our English, we have been improving our instructions for directing somebody at Tattershall farm Park and we are looking forward to writing these up. Our PE this week has been Gymnastics where we are learning about different ways of travelling and listening carefully to instruction.

Year 3 have learnt about Diwali this week and have enjoyed creating their own unique Rangoli patterns.

Year 4 have been busy this week learning about Hengest and Horsa the ruthless invaders from Denmark as part of our History learning. They have also been practising their star badge maths challenges, of which they have seen greater success.

In Year 5 we have been learning about space this week. We looked at different arguments for and against the Earth being spherical and concluded that there is significantly more evidence for a spherical Earth. We are really looking forward to visiting the National Space Centre next week to learn more about space.

This week Year 6 had their Outdoor Learning Day with Mrs Simons. They had a great time exploring the nature area and looking for signs of Autumn and creating rhyming couplets in preparation for their new poetry learning in English. Linking to History the children used sticks and twigs to try to recreate the Parthenon and looked at the ways they could help make their structures strong. Maths learning outside involved a scavenger hunt that required teamwork to solve the mathematical problems and using the correct vocabulary when explaining.

GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK



The first commandment that Jesus quotes is the great Jewish prayer known as the Shema (Deut 6: 4-5). This prayer is still recited each morning and evening by practicing Jews. This is an opportunity to ask ourselves how/if we still begin and end each day in prayer. Reciting this verse would be an ideal way to renew the practice of morning and evening

You must love the Lord your God with all your heart and with your whole mind, with your whole soul and with all your strength. What does this sentence tell us about ourselves and our God. What does this phrase tell us about the relationship we have with God, what does it tell us about God's relationship with us? It tells us who we are, where we came from, where we are going and how we are going to get there. All the law and every idea anyone ever had are summed up in this one relationship. Our duty is to live it out. The psalm sums up our response to the Good News of God's love for us and our recognition that we must love God and our neighbour before all else, it is a song of love and praise to God, a personal God, a God who is close at hand.

It is love that describes our response to the Lord and to each other because somehow they are mixed together in the curious chemistry that we are.

Encounter

Saint Paul is someone who, like all of the saints, is holy and close to God. It is easy to assume, especially as Paul wrote letters which are not part of the bible, that Paul was always holy, and never got anything wrong. But this isn't the case. Paul used to be called Saul, and lived a life which was not very holy at all.

FACTS AND CHALLENGES

Four fun Geography facts to share with your friends and family!

- 1. Hailstorms form when rain is swept upwards by the air currents in a thunderstorm into freezing cold areas of the atmosphere. In extreme conditions hailstones can be bigger than golf balls and cause lots of damage. The largest hailstone recorded was 22cm across this is the size of a large honeydew melon!
- 2. Niagra Falls are moving upstream! The falls formed 10,000 years ago and have eroded their way 11 kilometres upstream since then.
- 3. Mountain Everest is not the tallest mountain on Earth. Mauna Kea a volcano on the big island of Hawaii, has its base deep under the Pacific Ocean. It rises more than 10,210 metres from base to peak, although the peak is 4,207 metres above sea.
- 4. The Three Gorges Dam on the Yangtze River in China is the world's largest hydroelectric project. The dam is 2,335 metres long and 185 metres tall. It holds back such an immense weight of water that it slows the Earth's rotation, shortening the length of a day by 0.06 microseconds.


There are two age categories: 5-7 and 8-11 year-olds. All children need to do is write a story they would love to read in 500 Words or less.
