MESSAGE FROM MRS WITH Δ

The children in Foundation have settled quickly back into our busy routines and are really embracing their new topic Castles. They enjoyed their outdoor learning session looking at signs of winter and making their own binoculars!

r 1 have started their learning all about Vincent Van Gogh. They learned ways to recognise this paintings and responded to their favourites through words, drawings and paint. Their sketchbooks looked incredible! Well done year 1.

Year 2 have enjoyed their first week back in the New Year! We have been using the New Bluebots which are controlled through Bluetooth technology. We have been trying to be robots and control each other to move around the classroom to understand clear commands. We have also been learning about Shapes in Maths and revisiting our understanding of Vertices and edges. We are learning about the Artist Lowry in our Art this term and have been finding out about who Lowry was and what types of Art were produced.

Year 3 children had great fun re-enacting out a range of scenarios from our new Book "Escape from Pompeii". The children used props to enhance their acting and were able to evaluate and support each other. Some great ideas where shown and delivered.

Year 4 have started their settlement topic looking at where settlements are and why people in the past chose to settle in certain areas. They have also started their topic on teeth, identifying the different types of teeth we have.

Year 5 have settled well into the new term. They have been looking at the properties of different materials in Science and have conducted an experiment considering whether the materials are waterproof, conductors, absorbent and their flexibility.

This week Year 6 had the exciting opportunity to participate in a Magistrates Workshop. Emma Greene, a local magistrate came in and taught the children how the court system works in England and Wales, she explained what the processes happen when someone breaks the law. The classroom was then set up like a real Court Room and they acted out a real courtroom drama about a boy called Harri who had stolen Charlie's mobile phone- injuring Charlie in the process. Once the evidence was heard everyone looked at the options and decided on the best form of punishment for the crime committed. The children learnt that as a magistrate you have to decide upon the severity of the blame, harm and seriousness of the crime. It was great fun to learn about the court system and how it works and important that we all think about how our actions and decisions can have some serious consequences, resulting in having a criminal record which could effect the jobs that you are able to have when you are older.

Parking Reminder:

In the morning we allow and operate a drop and go option for families. This means you can drive into our car park and your child should get out independently and walk to the gate and onto the playground. We are receiving lots of complaints from parents understandably frustrated by delays caused by people not using the drop and go as intended.

Huge delays are being caused by parents that park in the car park to get out and go to the main office and by parents getting out of the car, spending time getting bags and resources out and then walking children to the gate. If your child cannot quickly get out of the car and walk to the gate themselves you need to park down the road and walk into school. If you need to go to the office you need to park elsewhere and walk in.

If this does not improve I will be locking the staff car park like the afternoons and no longer offer a Drop and Go system.

Please take care in this continued spell of cold weather and I hope you are able to enjoy some fresh air and family time this weekend. We look forward to seeing you next week for lots of new learning!

GOSPEL REFLECTION OF THE WEEK

Use of Tablets

Talk with your child about responsible use of their tablet

Discuss what is okay and not okay to use it for and look at the possible risks. Tell your child what they should do if something goes wrong while using it. This could be to turn off the screen and tell an adult.

Think about the location of the tablet

Will it be in a shared family space or in a bedroom? Where will the tablet charge overnight? Think about: setting time limits; reminding your child about the risks of communicating online with people that they do not know; and encouraging them to come to you with any worries.

Explore parental controls

Take a look at the controls available both on the tablet itself and on your home Wi-Fi. Talk these through with your child too. Parental controls are a helpful tool, but an open conversation with your child is the most important thing.

Each week the staff and pupils can all nominate their peers for this award, for those acts of mercy and kindness. New for this term 'Heart that Sees' stickers!




