MESSAGE FROM MRS WITH Δ

Foundation are enjoying their new topic 'Around the World'. They have learnt a song about the 5 oceans and have been investigating floating and sinking! In RE they are beginning to think about how can they help more, care more and share more, this Lent!

In Year 1, the children have been learning all about the journey of the Emperor Penguin's egg from being laid to becoming a chick. The children were enraptured by real life footage and a fabulous story book, which helped them begin to recount these events. Miss Whyles is very impressed by the quality and determination of the writers in her class. Well done.

Year 2 have been learning about seed germination in Science this week. They have been able to label the parts of the seed and describe seed germination as it develops into a plant. They have also been developing four different types of sentences including questions, exclamations, commands and statements related to their new class text The Last Tree.

This week in Year 3 the children really enjoyed their drama with our 'Now Press Play' immersive experience. They delved into a science world of forces, getting into space suits and flying to the Moon! What a way to start a new learning topic, they thoroughly enjoyed it, watch this space for photographs.

Y4 have had their first dance session this week which is linked to their History lessons about Vikings. During their DT session children were researching the facts about Vikings food and drinks. Did you know the Vikings often kept a pot of stew simmering over the fire for days or even weeks???? Yummy!

In Year 5 this week we have been exploring life cycles in our science lessons and are working towards creating our own poetry in English based on the life cycle of a butterfly.

This week Year 6 started a new History topic learning about the Shang Dynasty. They explored how artefacts found in a tomb can inform us about different aspects of life in that time. The children looked at images of real artefacts found in the tomb of Fu Hao- a warrior queen from the Shang Dynasty and made inferences about the Shang Dynasty era.

Parental Controls: Deciding what's appropriate for children to see online

The online world gives us access to a huge amount of information and services, but the scale of information available also means that there is content that is inappropriate for children. What is or isn't appropriate is up to individual parents and carers to decide, and could be based on things like age, ability, beliefs and family values.

What are parental controls?

Parental controls allow you to block and filter upsetting or inappropriate content. They work across your WiFi, phone network, individual apps and devices. Parental controls can help you to:

- plan what time of day your child can go online and how long for
- create content filters to block apps that may have <u>inappropriate content</u>
- manage the content different family members can see.

Kind Little Hands - Kathy Urban

A little boy is going about his day in the city when a bee drops from the sky into his outstretched hands. Spellbound by the perfect little creature, the boy also sees immediately that the bee is exhausted. Taking the bee to his grandfather for help, Grandpa suggests that they put the bee in his window box. When that doesn't work, Grandpa suggests they give the bee some sugar water. Slowly, the bee recovers and flies off. However, saving the bee has given the little boy a wonderful idea: if he and his Grandpa plant flower seeds across the city, then that will provide more places for the bees to find food and safety.

Don't Squish a Slug: A Wonderful Celebration of Marvellous Minibeasts - Yussef Rafik

Have you heard about the tongue-eating louse? Or the volcano snail? Do you know why the assassin bug is so named? Dive into a fascinating – and sometimes gory! - world of minibeasts.

This large-format book is a treasure trove of information about bugs or, rather, invertebrates. It's divided into five themed sections – on camouflage, defence mechanisms, record-breaking achievements, amazing ways minibeasts have evolved, and relationships (which are often parasitic).

The Great Theatre Rescue- Judith Eagle

Set in 1930s theatreland, this historical adventure is full of joy but also features shadowy characters, dramatic getaways, just the right level of jeopardy and some puzzling mysteries to unravel.

Wild Stowaways




At least 400 tropical creatures including frogs, snakes, lizards and insects accidentally arrived in the UK between 2021-2023. They were hidden in a variety of goods like cut flowers according to a Cambridge University study!

Dr Silviu Petrovan began investigating the wild hitchhikers in 2017 after a florist in Sheffield asked him to identify a frog that had been found in a bunch of roses. Dr Petrovan discovered that the Colombian tree frog had travelled 8,000km from its home in South America! Millions of plants and flowers are traded around the world each year, customs officials don't always spot the wildlife stowaways. That can be a problem, as the accidental travellers can bring diseases with them or become invasive pests.
