<b>beach</b>	A beach is a landform found along the coast of an ocean, sea, or lake.		
<b>sand dunes</b>	A hill or ridge of sand piled up by the wind is called a sand dune.		
<b>harbour</b>	An area of the sea at the coast where boats can be left safely.	<b>Types of Coastlines</b>	
<b>port</b>	A town or city with a harbour where ships load or unload.		
<b>attractions</b>	The human and physical features found in a particular place that often make people want to visit.		
<b>coast</b>	The land along a sea.		
<b>Irish Sea</b>	The body of water that separates Ireland and Great Britain.		
<b>English Channel</b>	Part of the Atlantic Ocean that separates England and France.
