

A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

Our youngest children in Foundation are doing so well as they get used to school life and build their daily routines. A big step this term has been joining the rest of the school for Mass.

In Year 1, the children enjoyed their outdoor learning with Mrs Simons. Despite the weather, they explored different objects and natural forms, using their senses to investigate and explore. They collected many autumn items and used them to make some funny self-portraits!

In Year 2 this week we have been learning to correctly form our letters in handwriting in preparation for joining each letter together later in the year. We have been enjoying the Building Boy book in our English lessons and extending our sentences whilst using past tense -ed endings. Our Maths learning has been superb this week with many children able to read, write and partition numbers to 100 and some have gone beyond to 1000! We have been learning about Animals including Humans and sorting events in their lifecycle.

Year 3 have been learning about plants and what they need to grow well. They have planned an investigation to find out how a plant might grow without some of what it needs and to make observations over time. They have also been learning about possessive apostrophes both singular and plural.

Year 4 were very proud of their first class worship of the year, they showcased their learning about the story of Abraham. Year 4 have also been busy learning about how to preposition of time and place in their English learning.

In maths children have been learning about how to find 1, 10, 100 or 1000 more or less than a given number and how to flexibly partition numbers to 10 000. Year 4 had a real treat on Friday afternoon when they enjoyed an audience with the author Swapna Haddow and the inspiration for her new book "The Terrible Trio".

This week in Year 5 we have been learning about what a covenant is. We have explored covenants from the bible between Moses and God and have considered how we can have a covenant relationship with God. This week Year 6 have been exploring genre and developing their ideas about their own reading preferences. We had some lovely discussions about our favourite books and the how reading for pleasure helps us to relax, develops our imagination, expands our vocabulary and allows us to experience different emotions. We then spent some time carefully choosing a reading book to read in school and at home. Some of us decided to try a new genre, whilst others tried a new author.

Notice: Several of you have asked if we can be flexible with uniform and allow polo shirts and shorts for those warmer days with regards to uniform. I am happy to facilitate this but if we can all ensure we are in Winter Uniform after half term. It is especially important to have full school smart winter uniform for School Photograph days. This week has been wet and windy but that has not stopped our curriculum adventures and I can see several classes are already full steam ahead booking in the first enrichment trips and visits of the year. For Parents - Talking to your Child about Online Safety

It's the area that a lot of parents struggle with yet it is the single most important aspect for any child of any age - continuing conversations with children to mitigate risk, including topics that can be very difficult to approach.

The NSPCC has some wonderful resources for parents including ageappropriate conversations and topics, top tips, guizzes and more. There's a lot of information and my tip would be to send out snippets of information, perhaps in your newsletter. For example you could say that in lessons with the children you've been having some lessons around how to stay safe online (with specific topics), then send out information just related to that topic. Parents are much more likely to read that, which in turn means they're more likely to talk to their children about it. You can find all the resources listed HERE.





ICON WEEK 2025

ICON Week 2025 (22–26 September) – Supporting Parents, Protecting Babies "Babies cry, you can cope!" This September, NHS services, local authorities, charities, and healthcare organisations across the country will join together once again to share important messages with parents and carers during ICON Week 2025 (22–26 September).

Now in its fourth year, ICON Week will focus on mental health and staying calm. The campaign reminds parents that infant crying is normal, provides practical coping strategies, and raises awareness of the dangers of shaking a baby - an action that can cause Abusive Head Trauma (AHT), leading to devastating brain injuries, disability, or even death.

The ICON programme is built around a simple, evidence-based message:

I - Infant crying is normal and will stop

C – Comfort methods can sometimes soothe the baby

O – It's OK to walk away for a few minutes if the baby is safe and the crying feels overwhelming N – Never shake or hurt a baby

This year, ICON Week is also highlighting that coping with crying is an issue for both men and women. For some men, finding someone to talk to and calming down before handling a baby can be an even bigger challenge. ICON encourages all parents to recognise the importance of asking for help and planning ahead for those difficult moments.



SAINT CARLO ACUTIS - A MODERN SAINT FOR YOUNG PEOPLE



Saint Carlo Acutis was an ordinary boy who loved football, computer games, and spending time with friends. What made him extraordinary was the way he loved Jesus. From a young age, Carlo had a deep devotion to the Eucharist and said that "the Eucharist is my highway to heaven."

Carlo was very talented with computers. Instead of just using his skills for fun, he used them to share his faith. He created a website that showed miracles of the Eucharist from around the world, helping people to see how amazing God's love truly is.

Even though Carlo became sick with leukaemia at only fifteen, he never lost his trust in God. He offered his suffering for the Church and for the Pope, showing great courage and faith, even in difficult times. Pope Francis called Carlo "a role model for young people" because he showed that holiness is possible for everyone, even children and teenagers. Carlo reminds us that being a saint doesn't mean doing extraordinary things - it means living each day with love for God and others.

As we remember Saint Carlo Acutis, may we learn from his example to pray often, to use our talents for good, and to keep Jesus at the centre of our lives.

God of our past, our present and our future,
God of our dreams, our designs and our decisions,
be love in us as we journey through this new school year.
