

## A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

This week in Foundation, the children had lots of fun bringing stories and learning to life! The children loved performing The Three Billy Goats Gruff — taking turns to be the goats and the troll, using fantastic voices and actions to retell the story. In maths, they have explored measuring heavy and light through lots of hands-on activities, comparing different classroom objects and using balance scales to see which items weighed more or less. They have also developed their fine motor skills with a creative leaf haircut activity, practising how to hold and control scissors safely while giving our leaves some stylish trims!

Year 1 have been learning about instructions. They had to follow steps to make a funny bear face mask using instructions that they heard as well as followed pictorially. They worked very hard and have been identifying the correct 'bossy' imperative verbs to give their own instructions. This week in Science, the children also enjoyed learning about taste, and tried many different flavours, identifying and then sorting them based on if they were sweet, salty or sour.

This week in Year 2, we have been reflecting on our instruction writing in English which we developed in Year 1 and focusing our skills on time conjunctions like Next, Firstly, After that. We have been learning about Animals and Humans in Science carrying out exercise to change our heart rates and improve our understanding of how this is good for our body. We have also begun to think about adding two digit numbers and how this looks when we count on or back for subtraction.

Year 3 have had another fantastic week! The children worked incredibly hard preparing for their worship and performed beautifully today – we're so proud of them. In English, they've been gathering fascinating facts from 'The Street Beneath My Feet' and planning their own pieces of writing. In maths, they've been practising column addition and subtraction with great focus and determination. To top it off, they had another brilliant swimming session, showing how well they're using the skills they've been learning. Well done, Year 3!

This week Year 4, have exploring The Explorer by Katherine Rundell — an exciting adventure story about courage, friendship, and survival in the Amazon Rainforest. As we journey alongside the characters, we have been discovering the wonders and dangers of the rainforest, and compare this amazing habitat to our very own Sherwood Forest in Nottinghamshire. We have been think about the similarities and differences between these two forests — from their wildlife and climate to how people interact with them today. In Science, we have been learning how to build electrical circuits and adding switches to make them work in different ways

In Year 5 this week, we have been designing stencils in Art to create our own piece of artwork inspired by the work of Banksy. We have been considering what message we would like to deliver and how we can do this through a mixture of images and text. We are looking forward to creating our final piece next week.

This week Year 6 have been exploring their learning through outdoor learning with Mrs Simons. They are developed their Geographical knowledge of mountains and explored den building. Outdoor learning has been a great way for the children to develop their oracy skills through explaining and giving instructions clearly when working as a team. It was great to see the children developing their skills further in a different learning environment.

Thank you to all the families that joined us for our family showcase on Monday 13<sup>th</sup> October it was so lovely to see how many of you attended and how excited the children were to show you our vibrant school, classrooms and most importantly their learning. So many of you took the time to speak with teachers and myself and Mrs Hibbert which make these events such a joy to put on for you. If you have not yet emailed or called the school to book a SEND review for your child please do so; I can book you in for next term, thank you to all those that have booked so far. As we prepare for this final week of school let's embrace Autumn with our Cosy Comfies Non-Uniform Day on Monday, I look forward to seeing a cosy collection of pupils Monday morning, I am sure I have a Stitch Snoodie I shall be digging out!




## SUBJECT HIGHLIGHTS

# 17/10/25 INTERNATIONAL DAY FOR THE ERADICATION OF POVERTY.


