A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

In Year 1 we have been having fun investigating smell in Science. We have learned that we have different senses and that our sense smell can save our life! We investigated how well we can identify different smell by conducting a 'blind test', trying to determine what was hidden in the pots. Some things were easy, but some puzzled us!

It has been a busy week in Year 2 with children using and applying their knowledge of place value and position of numbers on a number line. We have been learning how to add detail and create interesting setting sentences in our English written work. We have also enjoyed creating and participating in our Year 2 Celebration of the Word focusing on St. Therese and her Little Ways.

Year 3 have had a fantastic week filled with exciting learning! We've been diving into our wonderful new book The Street Beneath My Feet, discovering fascinating facts about the layers of the Earth and sharing our favourite findings with each other. In Geography, we've enjoyed comparing life in the East Midlands with the beautiful region of Tuscany, noticing both the similarities and the big differences between them. Our swimming sessions have shown brilliant progress – confidence and stamina are really shining through. On top of all this, the children have impressed us with their fabulous computing skills, showing creativity and problem-solving at every turn. Well done, Year 3 – what a busy and brilliant time of learning!

In Year 4 Science, the children investigated insulators and conductors, testing different materials to see which let electricity flow and which kept it safely blocked. In Maths, we have been practising rounding numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1,000, using number lines and practical activities to strengthen our place value knowledge. Meanwhile in Geography, children have been learning about the amazing animals that live thin the rain forest. They were especially fascinated by the canopy and the creatures that call it home! What a fantastic week of curiosity and learning in Year 4!

In Year 5 this week, we have been writing adventure stories based on the book Cosmic. Our stories involve Liam, a twelve year old boy, who has become lost in space. We have worked hard on our descriptive language and used a range of expanded noun phrases and relative clauses.

This week Year 6, in Geography, have been learning about how mountains are formed. They have found it really interesting to explore how the tectonic plates that move on the Earth's mantle are responsible for the formation of different mountain ranges and types of mountains. This has really helped the children with their English non-chronological report writing.

As we have seen the signs of Autumn creeping in and settling just a reminder to keep a watchful eye on the school newsletter next week which will have information about our Harvest Celebration and Focus. With the change of seasons, weather and daylight hours reducing, take time to focus on self-care. It is at this time of year many experience the impact of seasonal affective disorder or SAD. Please remember we are here to signpost you to support services and lend a listening ear with many staff including myself trained as Youth and Adult Mental Health First Aiders. Don't suffer in silence.

They wrote using hieroglyphics, a special alphabet made from pictures and symbols? They believed the River Nile was the most important part of their world, helping them grow food and travel from place to place


Some Egyptian kings and queens, called pharaohs, were buried with treasures and even food to take with them into the afterlife.


A special shoutout goes to some standout individual performances:
