A MESSAGE FROM MRS WITHERS

In Maths in EYFS this week, the children have been exploring the composition of numbers, building a solid foundation for their number sense through fun, hands-on activities. Their History lesson took them on an exciting journey to learn about where and why castles were built, sparking curiosity about life in the past. Meanwhile, in Art, they have been inspired by the vibrant work of Alma Thomas, with pupils creating their own colourful, patterned masterpieces.

This week, Year 1 have been busy across the curriculum! In Maths, the children are developing their understanding of place value by exploring numbers, tens and ones. In Art, they have been inspired by Vincent van Gogh, studying his use of lines and exploring different ways to mark make. In Computing, pupils are learning to use the Scratch app to create simple programs and develop early coding skills. In Geography, the children are learning about the countries of the UK and identifying their capital cities.

In Year 2 Maths, we have been learning all about money. The children have been adding and subtracting amounts, recognising different coins, and even finding change from one pound. Any support at home using real money, such as paying for items or checking change, would be extremely helpful to reinforce this learning. In Religious Education, we have been learning about John the Baptist and discussing how we can be more like Jesus through our thoughts, words and deeds. The children shared some thoughtful ideas about kindness, forgiveness, and helping others. We also had a very exciting Art lesson using messy charcoal! The children experimented with different techniques and explored how charcoal can be used to recreate artwork inspired by L. S. Lowry.

Year 3 have had a fabulous week; we have been reading more of our new book 'The Firework Maker's Daughter' and the children have been really enjoying the twists and turns of the story. We have been getting to grips with fronted adverbials in English and multiplication in Maths. Year 3 had lots of fun exploring the Scratch program in computing and we have started learning about the layers of the Earth, they are very excited to be learning about volcanoes next week. Well done year 3!

Year 4 have been learning about God's Kingdom and what it means for Christians today. In PE, the children enjoyed experimenting with symmetrical and asymmetrical shapes using their bodies and movements. In Science, we explored the structure of a human tooth and learned about the different parts and their functions. In English, the class has been diving into The Great British Food Bank Heist, exploring the characters in preparation for writing exciting story openers next week.

In year five this week we have started our computing unit on stop animation. We have learnt about what animation is and created our own simple zoetrope style animation. We are looking forward to planning and creating our stop animation piece later this term.

Year 6 have been exploring the Shakespeare play- Romeo and Juliet. They have read the play and are now developing their ideas to plan and write a balanced argument for the question: Who is to blame for the deaths of Romeo and Juliet.

Reminder: I have had a large group of parents and residents reporting a minority of parents parking and dropping off on the yellow zig zag markings- please do not do this it is not safe, causes delays and further congestion.

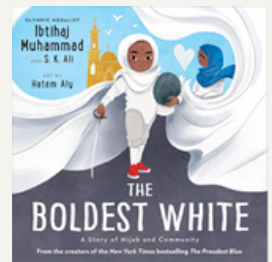

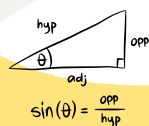
